02/10/84	Himalayan Griffon Gyps <u>himalayensis</u>	Two landed on a small rock outcrop halfway up the steep, bare slope of West Tillisha. The male picked up something (dirt or bits of grass?) in his bill, passed it to the female, and shortly thereafter they mated.
06/?/82	Eurasian Kestrel Falco tinnunculus	Nest above Dhukyel
09/03/82	Eurasian Kestrel	One adult and young(?) seen hovering on the hillside above our terrace, the apparent young diving often and unsuccessfully.
Mid-May 1984	Snow Cock Tetraogallus him. T. tibetanus	Rod flushed female (species not noted) off nest with 2 eggs. She then abandoned nest (about 15,000 feet in alpine grassland). Gary Ahlborn has notes on both species nesting in that area.
05/06/83	Chuckor Alectoris graeca	Courtship? one doing circles around the other, dragging a wing while passing in front
07/03/83	Chuckor	Rod's note: "Below me, on a lichen crusted boulder, the chukor calls angrily more than 5 minutes after I flushed her and five fledglings, screeching from the sheltered shrub by the trail."
08/11/82	Snow partridges Lerwa lerwa	A covy of adults with chicks at Chynath (about 15,000 ft.). We surprised them at 20 feet. They didn't fly, or even run, but made their way carefully among the rocks, slowly increasing the distance between us and them, calling loud and often.
06/?/82	Yellow billed chough Pyrrhocorax graculus	Rod's diary entry for June 21: "They nest in crevices in the cliff and feed among the sage." P. pyrrhocorax also nests along the Langu
04/23/83	Crow Corvus macrorhynchos	Nesting (2 young?) at top of pine
06/05/85	Crow	Young fledged. Camp staff "stole" one from its perch on a pine branch, raising a cacophony of caw-cawing crows; the little one in the man's hand and the big ones flying over his head, trying to save their baby. A Eurasian Cockoo joined in the clamor, cuckooing incessantly, long after the crisis was over and the

men had set the chick free.

06/?/82	Tickell's leaf warbler Phylloscopus affinis	Building nest on Choyap Terrace
07/01/?	Tickell's leaf warbler	Nest (enclosed oval in caragana bush) with 4 eggs.
07/17/82	Tickell's Leaf Warbler	One of the nests was raided, the eggs eaten and the feather lining scattered through a hole made in the side, as well as out the entrance. The featheres used for lining had been taken from a kill site nearby, where a large bird, possibly pheasant or snow cock had been eaten.
07/30/82	Tickells' leaf Warblers	Fledged
7/10/82	Crowned leaf warbler P. reguloides	Feeding young in nest (unlocated), chasing off Tickell's
07/16/82	Crowned leaf warbler	Fledged
07/?/?	Blue headed redstart Phoenicurus caeruleocep	Fledged nalus
05/06/83	White capped river chat <u>Chaimarrornis</u> <u>leucocephalus</u>	Two flew across the Langu to a side stream. One threw back its head, pushed out its chest and spread its tail. The other, inches away, watched. They remained motionless for a minute or two, then flew a couple of feet up, touched briefly and flew off across the stream.
06/?/82	Blue rock thrush monticola solitarius	Female with young on Choyap terrace
04/?/82	Whistling thrush Myiophoneus caeruleus	Courting, calling, flying back and forth across the Langu
07/17/82	Whistling thrush	Rod's note: "Fledged whistling thrushes abound, their sharp rasps and soft whistles carried afar, echoing off rock cliffs."
09/03/82	Grey wagtail Motacilla caspica	Family of three, the young snapping up insects. No notes on cano, but I think I adult & 2 young.
05/04/83	Pied Wagtail M. Alba	Nesting at Eding (see 7/4/82)
07/04/82	Pied wagtail	Adults carrying insects to chicks (4).
07/10/82	Pied wagtail	Above chicks were still in nest, but were scattered by co-worker when he got too close. Nest a depression in sand at base of caragana bush surrounded by dried grass and lined with down. Located in center of gravel bar approx. 20m x 140m. Dimensions of nest: inside 3"x3" out 6"x6" 1.5" deep.

07/15/82	Pied wagtail and White Capped river chat	Adults of both species seen "mobbing" whistling thrushes around nests presumably
04/?/84	Spot wing black tit Parus melanolophus	Co-worker "accidently" shot bird (unsexed) with slingshot. Said he regretted doing so because it had a mate
04/23/83	White throated tit Aegithalos niveogularis	Nesting in juniper sapling (see 6/5/83)
06/05/83	White throated tit	Feeding young in nest. Nest a compact ball, can't see young. One adult seen passing food to the other at the nest, then flying off

Notes from Diary: I've been watching two nests: crows and white throated tits. Both pairs began the building a month ago [see entry above for 04/23]; the crows near the top of a tall pine, and the tits in the lower branches of a young juniper about 100 feet from the crow's tree. Both trees are on the sloping river bluff. Now they are feeding young ones. It looks like the crows have two, for I saw their big bills pointed skyward as the parents stood on the edge of the nest poking in bits of garbage from our kitchen. I can't see the young tits as the nest is a round ball with a small hole for entrance/exit. But the adults also come near our kitchen to feed on the bushes, and I'm amazed at how close they come to me -- a couple of feet doesn't worry them at all.

7/10/82	Rock bunting Emberiza cia	Feeding fledged young
07/17/82	Rock bunting	Fledged

This seems to be a peak for fledgling rock buntings and crowned leaf warblers. Many family groups of 3-4 young in poplus/pine and the shrubs at the inside terrace edges.

Additional Notes

Add to main list:

Snow partridge (<u>Lerwa lerwa</u>), Block 10, about 15,500 feet (seen above Dolphu Village in Alpine grasland/rock fields). We made only one visit to the location, so cannot really comment on abundance

Tibetan partridge (Perdix hodgsoniae), Block 10, 10,000 feet, in brush (seen by Rod June 1982)
