

The following is an annotated trip list for a visit to Nepal from 15th April to 3rd May 1998. Observers were Alan Rogers, Neil Cheshire, Tim Kenney and David Close ably assisted by guides Sukhi Ram Chaudhari, Dukhi Ram Chaudhari and Vishnu at Gaida and Hathan Chaudhary and Ramesh Kharki at Kosi Tappu. A list of localities visited with dates is given in Appendix A. 322 species were recorded by the party, however, not all species were seen by all members.

Alba dogos (Ala)

The sequence of species follows Inskipp (1988) while the taxonomy and English names follow Inskipp, Lindsey & Duckworth (1996) except where noted. Common and widespread species are listed without details.

Abbreviations for localities are as follows:- UP - Upper Phulchowki (two small houses upwards) LP - Lower Phulchowki, GR - Ravine above Godaveri, G - Godaveri area from St Xavier's School up to the Ravine, BG - Royal Botanical Gardens Godaveri, N - Nagarjung (lower slopes), KV - Other general areas in the Kathmandu Valley, GJ - Riverine forest and areas near Gaida Jungle Camp, GT - Sal forest and grassland areas near Gaida Tented Camp, CH - Churia Hills, KT - area and river near Kosi Tappu Wildlife Camp, KB - Kosi Barrage area, DF - Dharan Forest north-east of Kosi Tappu.

Red-crested Pochard (Rhodonessa rufina) 6KT, 10 KB

Common Pochard (Aythya ferina) 10 KB

Black Baza (Aviceda leuphotes) Two pairs around GT and at DF

Oriental Honey-buzzard (Pernis ptilorhynchus) Up to 7 GJ, 2 KT

Black-shouldered Kite (Elanus caeruleus) Singles KT

Black Kite (Milvus milvans) Nest with young approx. midway between Kathmandu and Mugling

Pallas's Fish Eagle (Haliaeetus leucoryphus) Single on the Kosi River

White-rumped Vulture (Gyps bengalensis) 2 GT, 19 KB, 2DF

Long-billed Vulture (Gyps indicus) 2 KB, single DF

Eurasian Griffon (Gyps fulvus) Single near the Kosi River

Crescent Serpent Eagle (Spilornis cheela) Up to 3 GJ/GT, 4 DF

Eurasian Marsh Harrier (Circus aeruginosus) Single GJ, 2 KB

Crested Goshawk (Accipiter trivirgatus) Single at DF

Shikra (Accipiter badius) Single at G, up to 2 daily GT/GJ, 3DF, 2KT

White-eyed Buzzard (Butastur teesa) Single at GJ

Black Eagle (Ictinaetus malayensis) Pairs and singles on three days LP/UP. A stunning display flight lasting for several minutes was witnessed on 30/4 at UP when one bird repeatedly swooped steeply downwards for 50-100 metres with closed wings then pulled out in a sharp U-turn to ride the thermals almost vertically upwards, again on tightly closed wings. As momentum slowed at the top of the climb the bird rather lazily flipped over and began another descent. No count was made but this process would have been repeated ten or more times and throughout little or no altitude was lost. No other bird was observed but could have been present.

Changeable Hawk Eagle (Spizaetus cirrhatus) A dark phase flew low overhead at GJ while singles were seen en route to and at DF

Mountain Hawk Eagle (Spizaetus nipalensis) 2 DF

Osprey (Pandion haliaetus) Singles at GJ and KB

Collared Falconet (Microhierax caerulescens) 3 at GT on successive days

Common Kestrel (Falco tinnunculus) 2 GJ, single near DF

Eurasian Hobby (Falco subbuteo) 2 in Kathmandu Valley 15/4

Black Francolin (Francolinus francolinus) Up to 2 seen/heard daily GJ/GT/KT

Swamp Francolin (Francolinus gularis) Marvellous views of 3 from the levee at KT

Red Junglefowl (Gallus gallus) Max 3 GJ, up to 8 GT, heard DF & KT

Kalij Pheasant (Lophura leucomelanos) At LP a pair and two singles on 16/4 and a single 30/4

Indian Peafowl (Pavo cristatus) Common and displaying GJ/GT max 40

Ruddy-breasted Crake (Porzana fusca) One glimpsed at KT

Brown Crake (Amaurornis akool) 2 GJ

White-breasted Waterhen (Amaurornis phoenicurus) Up to 2 GJ/GT, up to 10 KB/KT

Common Moorhen (Gallinula chloropus) 20+ GJ, 10+ KB/KT

Purple Gallinule (Porphyrio porphyrio) Single near Kasara, up to 5 KT/KB. This was the subspecies poliocephalus and strikingly different from melanotus in Australia with turquoise blue/green wings, face, throat and breast and a dark blue back.

Bengal Florican (Houbaropsis bengalensis) Very exciting to see a breeding plumaged male in grassland near Dumaria. In flight the black body and gleaming white wings were very striking.

Pheasant-tailed Jacana (Hydrophasianus chirurgus) One in full plumage KB

Bronze-winged Jacana (Metopidius indicus) 10+ at the 20,000 lakes near GJ, up to 4 KB/KT

Black-winged Stilt (Himantopus himantopus) 6 KB

Pied Avocet (Recurvirostris avosetta) 10 at KB were a rare sighting according to Hathan

Eurasian Thick-knee (Burhinus oedicnemus) 2 KT

Great Thick-knee (Esacus recurvirostris) Single KT

Small Pratincole (Glareola lactea) Common KT probably numbering hundreds

Little Ringed Plover (Charadrius dubius) Up to 12 GJ, up to 10 KT

Kentish Plover (Charadrius alexandrinus) 3 KT

Lesser Sand Plover (Charadrius mongolus) c. 15 KT

Pacific Golden Plover (Pluvialis fulva) 40+ KT

River Lapwing (Vanellus duvaucelii) 2 GJ, single KT

Red-wattled Lapwing (Vanellus indicus) 4 GJ, up to 12 KT/KB

Little Stint (Calidris minuta) 7 KT

Temminck's Stint (Calidris temminckii) Max 2 GJ, up to 12 KT

Common Snipe (Gallinago gallinago) 2 KT

Black-tailed Godwit (Limosa limosa) Single at KB

Eurasian Curlew (Numenius arquata) Singles KT and KB

Common Redshank (Tringa totanus) 30 KB

Common Greenshank (Tringa nebularia) Up to 6 GJ and 10 KT

Green Sandpiper (Tringa ochropus) Up to 3 GJ, 6+ KT

Common Sandpiper (Actitis hypoleucos) 5 GJ, single KT

Great Black-headed Gull (Larus ichthyaetus) 2 at KT and a single at KB were considered to be in second winter plumage. [Pallas's Gull---Inskipp et al]

River Tern (Sterna aurantia) c.20 KT/KB

Black-bellied Tern (Sterna acuticauda) 2 KT

Little Tern (Sterna albifrons) Up to 10 KT

Whiskered Tern (Chlidonias hybridus) Singles KT, 20 KB

White-winged Tern (Chlidonias leucopterus) Single summer plumaged adult KT 25/4

Rock Pigeon (Columba livia)

Eurasian Collared Dove (Streptopelia decoaocto) Up to 4 GJ, 2 KT

Red Collared Dove (Streptopelia tranquebarica) Up to 4 KV and GJ, 6 GT

Oriental Turtle Dove (Streptopelia orientalis)

Spotted Dove (Streptopelia chinenis)

Emerald Dove (Chalcophaps indica) Up to 2 GJ/GT, single DF area

Orange-breasted Green Pigeon (Treron bicincta) 3 GT, 4 KT

Pompadour Pigeon (Treron pompadora) Single GT

Yellow-footed Green Pigeon (Treron phoenicoptera) Single GT, 2 DF

Wedge-tailed Green Pigeon (Treron sphenura) Only one positively identified UP but several others probable LP/UP

Alexandrine Parakeet (Psittacula eupatria) Up to 8 GJ/GT

Ring-necked Parakeet (Psittacula krameri) Up to 3 KV, numerous in flocks GJ/GT, up to 4 KT/KB, 20 DF

Plum-headed Parrakeet (Psittacula cyanocephala) Up to 6 GJ/GT, 2KT/DF

Red-breasted Parrakeet (Psittacula alexandri) 6+ GJ/GT, single KT, 2 DF

Common Hawk Cuckoo (Hierococcyx varius) Common all lowland areas calling, few seen

Large Hawk Cuckoo (Hierococcyx sparverioides) Few calling UP/LP/GR, only 2 seen

Grey-bellied Cuckoo (Cacomantis passerinus) 2 KT, single DF

Indian Cuckoo (Cuculus micropterus) A few calling UP/GR/N. Common all lowland areas, their call becoming a feature of life. Several seen

Eurasian Cuckoo (Cuculus canorus) Regularly calling and some sighted KV/GR/G/GJ/GT/N

Oriental Cuckoo (Cuculus saturatus) A few calling GR/UP/DF, none sighted

Drongo Cuckoo (Surniculus lugubris) Single heard and seen GJ, heard DF

Common Koel (Eudynamus scolopacea) Heard calling all areas except UP and regularly seen. Calls appeared identical or very similar to those in Australia, however, one female seen very closely had the chin, throat and upper breast heavily spotted quite different from birds in Sydney.

[Asian Koel---Inskipp et al who treat Australian Koel (Eudynamus cyanocephala) as separate form]

Green-billed Malkoha (Phaenicophaeus tristis) Single GT, up to 3 N

Greater Coucal (Centropus sinensis) Singles GJ, common KT max. 15

Lesser Coucal (Centropus bengalensis) Only at GJ/GT where up to 5 seen daily

Barn Owl (Tyto alba) Single bird seen at dusk on 29/4 perched on top of an old building approximately mid way between Godaveri and Patan. Although it is heavily built up along this main road there is open country nearby behind the buildings

Collared Scops Owl (Otus bakkamoena) Single roosting GJ

Oriental Scops Owl (Otus sunia) Heard and up to 3 seen GT

Brown Fish Owl (Keputa zeylonensis) 2 seen from elephants GJ

Jungle Owlet (Glaucidium radiatum) Singles seen and heard GJ/GT/KT/DF

Brown Hawk Owl (Ninox scutulata) Single seen and heard GT

Spotted Owlet (Athene brama) 3 near nest GJ, 2 KT

Savanna Nightjar (Caprimulgus affinis) 4+ hawking over open country near Dumaria

Large-tailed Nightjar (Caprimulgus macrurus) Heard nightly at GT and one seen

Grey Nightjar (Caprimulgus indicus) Heard only GT

[Himalayan Swiftlet (Collocalia brevirostris) Swiftlets seen in mixed feeding flocks high over KV were considered but not confirmed to be this species]

White-rumped Needletail (Zoonavena sylvatica) 3 + at 20,000 lakes area near GJ, 6+ GT

Alpine Swift (Tachymarptis melba) 2 GT, 12+ along main highway en route to KT, 2 near DF

House Swift (Apus affinis)

Crested Treeswift (Hemiprocne coronata) 2 GT, 3 DF

Red-headed Trogon (Harpactes erythrocephalus) Loose flock of 7 watched at CH for some minutes

White-throated Kingfisher (Halcyon smyrnensis) Common throughout the lowlands, heard GR and up to 2 N

Stork-billed Kingfisher (Halcyon capensis) Singles GJ/GT, up to 4 KT

Common Kingfisher (Alcedo atthis) 2 GJ, singles KT

Blue-eared Kingfisher (Alcedo meninting) Pair GT

Pied Kingfisher (Ceryle rudis) 10+ GJ, up to 5 KT/KB

Blue-bearded Bee-eater (Nyctyornis athertoni) Single GT, heard DF

Green Bee-eater (Merops orientalis) Up to 5GJ, up to 20 KT/KB/DF...

Blue-tailed Bee-eater (Merops philippinus) c. 50 GJ/GT, 100+ KT

Chestnut-headed Bee-eater (Merops leschenaulti) Seen daily all lowland areas max 20

Indian Roller (Coracias benghalensis) Seen daily all lowland areas

Dollarbird (Eurystomus orientalis) Up to 20 GJ/GT, 5 DF, heard KT

Hoopoe (Upupa epops) Single GJ, up to 3 KT

Oriental Pied Hornbill (Anthracoceros albirostris) A pair heard and seen briefly GT, also heard DF

Great Barbet (Megalaima virens) Often calling UP/LP/GR/N, max seen 3 GR

Lineated Barbet (Megalaima lineata) Calling daily lowland forests, max 6 GJ/GT, 3DF

Blue-throated Barbet (Megalaima asiatica) 4 CH and KT where breeding, 3 DF and calling N

Coppersmith Barbet (Megalaima haemacephala) Singles seen GJ/KT, heard KV

Speckled Piculet (Picumnus innominatus) Pairs seen G/N

Rufous Woodpecker (Celeus brachyurus) Male well seen at N

Lesser Yellownape (Picus chlorolophus) Up to 3 GJ/GT, 2 DF, single KT

Greater Yellownape (Picus flavinucha) Up to 2 GJ/GT

Grey-headed Woodpecker (Picus canus) Up to 6 GJ/GT, singles DF and N, heard GR

Streak-throated Woodpecker (Picus xanthopygaeus) 2 GT

Himalayan Flameback (Dinopium shorii) 3+ GT, single DF

Black-rumped Flameback (Dinopium benghalense) 2 GJ and KT

Greater Flameback (Chrysocolaptes lucidus) Pairs at GJ and GT

Darjeeling Woodpecker (Dendrocopos darjellensis) Single bird seen on separate days UP

Rufous-bellied Woodpecker (Dendrocopos hyperythrus) 3 UP

Fulvous-breasted Woodpecker (Dendrocopos macei) Up to 6 daily GJ/GT, singles N

Grey-capped Pygmy Woodpecker (Dendrocopos canicapillus) Up to 5 most days GJ/GT, 2 DF and KT

Rufous-winged Bushlark (Mirafra assamica) Up to 2 GJ, up to 4 KT

Ashy-crowned Sparrow Lark (Eremopterix grisea) 5 KT

Sand Lark (Calandrella raytal) 4+ GJ, up to 6 KT

Oriental Skylark (Alauda gulgula) 2+ GJ, 4 KT

Plain Martin (Riparia paludicola) Very common most lowland waterways

Barn Swallow (Hirundo rustica)

Red-rumped Swallow (Hirundo daurica) A few KV, 20+ DF

Paddyfield Pipit (Anthus rufulus) Up to 5 GJ, up to 2 KT/KB

Olive-backed Pipit (Anthus hodgsoni) 2 BG, 2 GJ and single KT

Citrine Wagtail (Motacilla citreola) Single males GJ and KT

Grey Wagtail (Motacilla cinerea) Single KV

White-browed Wagtail (Motacilla maderaspatensis) Up to 6 GJ

Common Woodshrike (Tephrodornis pondicerianus) 3 CH, 8 GT and single DF

Large Woodshrike (Tephrodornis gularis) 3 DF

Bar-winged Flycatcher-shrike (Hemipus picatus) 2 CH, single GT

Black-winged Cuckooshrike (Coracina melaschistos) 2+ G, 2 GT, 4 N and a single DF

Large Cuckooshrike (Coracina macei) Up to 8 GJ/GT, 2 DF and KT. Noticeable differences in appearance, behaviour and call compared with novaehollandiae lend support to their separation.

Scarlet Minivet (Pericrocotus flammeus) Up to 6 GJ/GT, 8 DF and 4 KT

Long-tailed Minivet (Pericrocotus ethologus) Up to 6 G, 10 UP and 6 N

Small Minivet (Pericrocotus cinnamomeus) Up to 4 GJ/GT

Striated Bulbul (Pycnonotus striatus) 2 UP

Black-crested Bulbul (Pycnonotus melanicterus) 2+ GT, 6 DF

Red-whiskered Bulbul (Pycnonotus jocosus)

Himalayan Bulbul (Pycnonotus leucogenys) Up to 16 at G, scarce in the lowlands

Red-vented Bulbul (Pycnonotus cafer)

Mountain Bulbul (Hypsipetes mcclellandii) Singles at LP and N

Black Bulbul (Hypsipetes leucocephalus) 20+ CH, up to 8 N and a single at G

Common Iora (Aegithina tiphia) Seen and heard in small numbers all lowland areas. Heard only at N

Golden-fronted Leafbird (Chloropsis aurifrons) 3 at CH and KT, 5 DF

Orange-bellied Leafbird (Chloropsis hardwickii) Single CH

Indian Blue Robin (Luscinia brunnea) Male at GR 17/4. A pair found in the grounds of the Kosi Tappu Wildlife Camp 25-26/4 caused some excitement for Hathan being the first record for KT and probably the lowest altitude record for Nepal.

Oriental Magpie Robin (Copsychus saularis)

White-rumped Shama (Copsychus malabaricus) Seen and heard GJ/GT, 3+ DF, heard KT

Black Redstart (Phoenicurus ochruros) Single at KT on two days

Plumbeous Water Redstart (Rhyacornis fuliginosus) 2 very confiding immatures BG

White-tailed Stonechat (Saxicola leucura) Single KT

Pied Bushchat (Saxicola caprata) Up to 6 daily GJ/GT

Grey Bushchat (Saxicola ferrea) Up to 6 G, 2 UP

Blue-capped Rock Thrush (Monticola cinclorhynchus) Up to 3 N

Blue Whistling Thrush (Myophonus caeruleus) Up to 10 G and BG, 4+ N

Pied Thrush (Zoothera wardii) Surprised and very pleased to find 2 breeding plumaged males in the area below the ravine at Godaveri on 17/4

Orange-headed Thrush (Zoothera citrina) Single bird seen on two days G, single regularly GJ and up to 3 GT

Black-backed Forktail (Enicurus immaculatus) Pair CH

Spotted Forktail (Enicurus maculatus) Two pairs at G and one at BG

Chestnut-headed Tesia (Tesia castaneocoronata) Up to 7 in two localities UP

Grey-bellied Tesia (Tesia cyaniventer) At least 3 calling and seen GR

Pale-footed Bush Warbler (Cettia pallidipes) Single birds seen and heard GT

Zitting Cisticola (Cisticola juncidis) Odd pairs seen GJ/GT/KT

Plain Prinia (Prinia inornata) Up to 2 daily GJ, single KT

Grey-breasted Prinia (Prinia hodgsonii) Up to 8 GJ/GT/CH

Yellow-bellied Prinia (Prinia flaviventris) Up to 3 GJ/GT, single KT

Grey-crowned Prinia (Prinia cinereocapilla) 2 CH, up to 6 GT

Common Tailorbird (Orthotomus sutorius)

Bristled Grassbird (Chaetornis striatus) A single bird well watched by telescope on the western bank of the Kosi River on 25/4 was an exciting find according to Hathan. Two further birds singing (pairs?) on the eastern bank made it an exceptional day for this rare species in Nepal

Striated Grassbird (Megalurus palustris) Singles GJ and KT

Blyth's Reed Warbler (Acrocephalus dumetorum) Single GJ, up to 4 in the grounds of the Kosi Tappu Wildlife Camp

Golden-spectacled Warbler (Seicercus burkii) Up to 8 UP, up to 6 G/GR

Chestnut-crowned Warbler (Seicercus castaniceps) 2+ GR, 2 UP

Grey-hooded Warbler (Seicercus xanthoschistos) Up to 20 UP and similar numbers LP/GR/G, 2 N

Black-faced Warbler (Abroscopus schisticeps) Up to 5 UP

Greenish Warbler (Phylloscopus trochiloides) The common Phylloscopus with records from most forest sites. Max 10 G/GR and GJ, 8+ KT, 6 UP

Ashy-throated Warbler (Phylloscopus maculipennis) Up to 6 UP

Lemon-rumped Warbler (Phylloscopus chloronotus) Singles UP and GR

Yellow-browed Warbler (Phylloscopus inornatus) A single at UP 16/4 and up to 5 at G/GR 17/4 all appeared to be typical inornatus. Inskipp & Inskipp (1985) say inornatus is "an uncommon winter visitor and passage migrant from March to mid-April" while P. humei is "an abundant passage migrant in spring and autumn"

Tickell's Leaf Warbler (Phylloscopus affinis) At least one, probably more KV 15/4 and G 17/4

Rufous -bellied Niltava (Niltava sundara) Up to 2 UP

Pale-chinned Flycatcher (Cyornis poliogenys) Common around the Gaida Tented Camp where a nest was found. Up to 10 DF

Blue-throated Flycatcher (Cyornis rubeculoides) Single GJ, heard singing and seen N

Verditer Flycatcher (Eumyias thalassina) Up to 6 UP and G, single N

Dark-sided Flycatcher (Muscicapa sibirica) Up to 12 GR/G/BG on 17/4, 2 UP, singles KT/DF

Asian Brown Flycatcher (Muscicapa dauurica) 10 UP on 16/4, single KT

Ultramarine Flycatcher (Ficedula superciliaris) 2 UP on 16/4

Little Pied Flycatcher (Ficedula westermanni) Pair UP on 30/4

Rufous-gorgeted Flycatcher (Ficedula strophiata) Pair UP on 30/4

Red-throated Flycatcher (Ficedula parva) Singles CH and KT

Grey-headed Canary Flycatcher (Culicicapa ceylonensis) Singles UP and GR, 2 N

Yellow-bellied Fantail (Rhipidura hypoxantha) 4 UP on 30/4

White-throated Fantail (Rhipidura albicollis) Small numbers GJ/GT/KT/G, max 4 GT

Asian Paradise-flycatcher (Terpsiphone paradisi) Delightfully common GJ with up to 10 in a day; all males white.

Single GT and 2 KT where white and rusty males seen together

Black-naped Monarch (Hypothymis azurea) Single GJ

Puff-throated Babbler (Pellorneum ruficeps) Up to 6 GJ and 4 GT, heard DF

Rusty-cheeked Scimitar Babbler (Pomatorhinus erythrocnemis) Up to 8 N and 2 G

Streak-breasted Scimitar Babbler (Pomatorhinus ruficollis) 2 UP appeared to be carrying nesting material

Striped Tit Babbler (Macronous gularis) Up to 4 GJ, heard DF

Chestnut-capped Babbler (Timalia pileata) Up to 6 at both GJ and GT

Yellow-eyed Babbler (Chrysomma sinense) Up to 8 GT

Black-throated Parrotbill (Paradoxornis nipalensis) Up to 20 UP

Striated Babbler (Turdoides earlei) Up to 10 KT

Slender-billed Babbler (Turdoides longirostris) Up to 4 GT

Jungle Babbler (Turdoides striatus) Up to 15 seen daily GJ/GT, up to 8 KT

White-throated Laughingthrush (Garrulax albogularis) Up to 10 GR/LP/UP

NOTE

Aside from a number of birds seen only fleetingly and hence unidentifed, only one observation remains a bit of a mystery. This involved two or more birds watched amongst a mixed feeding flock in the small valley near the top of Phulchowki. Being amongst foliage only the head patterning was seen well, however, this was striking. The crown and nape were a uniform clear grey bordered distinctly with black that demarcated the obvious white face patch which surrounded the eye. The birds appeared similar in size to Fulvettas and were in fact mixed in with both Rufous-winged and White-browed Fulvettas. The only species in the "Pictorial Guide" with a somewhat similar head pattern and colouration is the Greyheaded Parrotbill, however, this is mentioned only as a comparison and in no way is the sighting claimed as such. Any comments or suggestions would be appreciated.
