Subhadra Mitra Channa teaches Social Anthropology at the University of Delhi. She is interested in the study of marginal groups in Indian society, including those belonging to the dalits, tribes and women as a category. She is the author of two books and editor of two books, and has edited two encyclopedias. She was the President of the Indian Anthropological Association and currently is editor of the *Indian Anthropologist*, the journal of the Association. She is also co-chair of the Commission on the Anthropology of Women, an international body.

Sondra L. Hausner is an anthropologist based in Kathmandu, Nepal. She currently works as the Research Advisor for Save the Children, an international NGO, on projects relating to migration, sexuality, social structure, and religion in South Asia. Her forthcoming book *Wandering in Place: The social world of Hindu renunciation* won the 2004 Joseph W. Elder Prize in the Indian Social Sciences and will be published next year by Indiana University Press.

Isabelle Riaboff specializes in the anthropology of the Tibetan-speaking population groups of the Western Himalayas. Her current research focuses on cultural hybridity and identity construction in the Indo-Tibetan borderland, with particular emphasis on the regions of Paldar and Kinnaur. She is associate member of the Paris-based “Langues et Cultures de l’Aire Tibétaine” project team (Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique & Ecole Pratique des Hautes Etudes).

Sara Shneiderman is a PhD candidate in Anthropology at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York, USA. She has worked in Nepal since 1994, holding a Fulbright Fellowship there in 1999-2000. Her dissertation research ventures across the Nepal border to India (Darjeeling) and China (Tibet) to focus comparatively on the construction of ethnic, religious, and political identity in multiple national contexts for the Thangmi, a marginalized community with populations in all three countries.
